Clearwater Program

The Los Angeles County Sanitation District's Clearwater Program is designed to study the needs of the County for reclaiming, reusing and dumping wastewater. Part of this program is to evaluate two tunnels which run from the Carson treatment plant, under the Palos Verdes Peninsula, to the ocean shelf. The two tunnels, one built in 1937 and the other in 1958, have not been inspected in almost 50 years. Both tunnels are in use every day and cannot be taken out of service for inspection. The program is studying the viability of building a new tunnel and ocean outfall to divert flow from the old tunnels, take them out of service for inspection and then, if necessary, repair them.

Clearwater proposes that the logical areas for the outfall would be the Palos Verdes Shelf or the San Pedro Shelf. The tunnel would be deep underground. The identified potential tunnel alignments follow major streets: Stephen M. White Drive, Gibson Boulevard, Western Avenue, Gaffey Street, Pacific Avenue, Harbor Boulevard, Figueroa Street, Frigate Avenue, and Wilmington Boulevard. Due to the tunneling distances to reach the outfall or shelf, two construction shafts will be needed to lower equipment into the tunnel and remove excavated soil. One construction shaft

site will be located in Carson.

Clearwater has identified 13 potential shaft locations for the second construction site as meeting their minimum screening criteria: the US Navy Fuel Depot, Eastview Park, Field of Dreams, Peck Park, the Port of Los Angeles, Averill Park, Friendship Park, Fort McArthur, White Point Nature Preserve, Royal Palms State Beach, Angels Gate Park, Cabrillo Beach, and Point Fermin Park.

Whatever site is selected, Clearwater predicts the following: eight years of construction, 50–100 trucks per day going to and from the site to remove excavated dirt and rocks, and high sound walls to shield surrounding areas from noise.

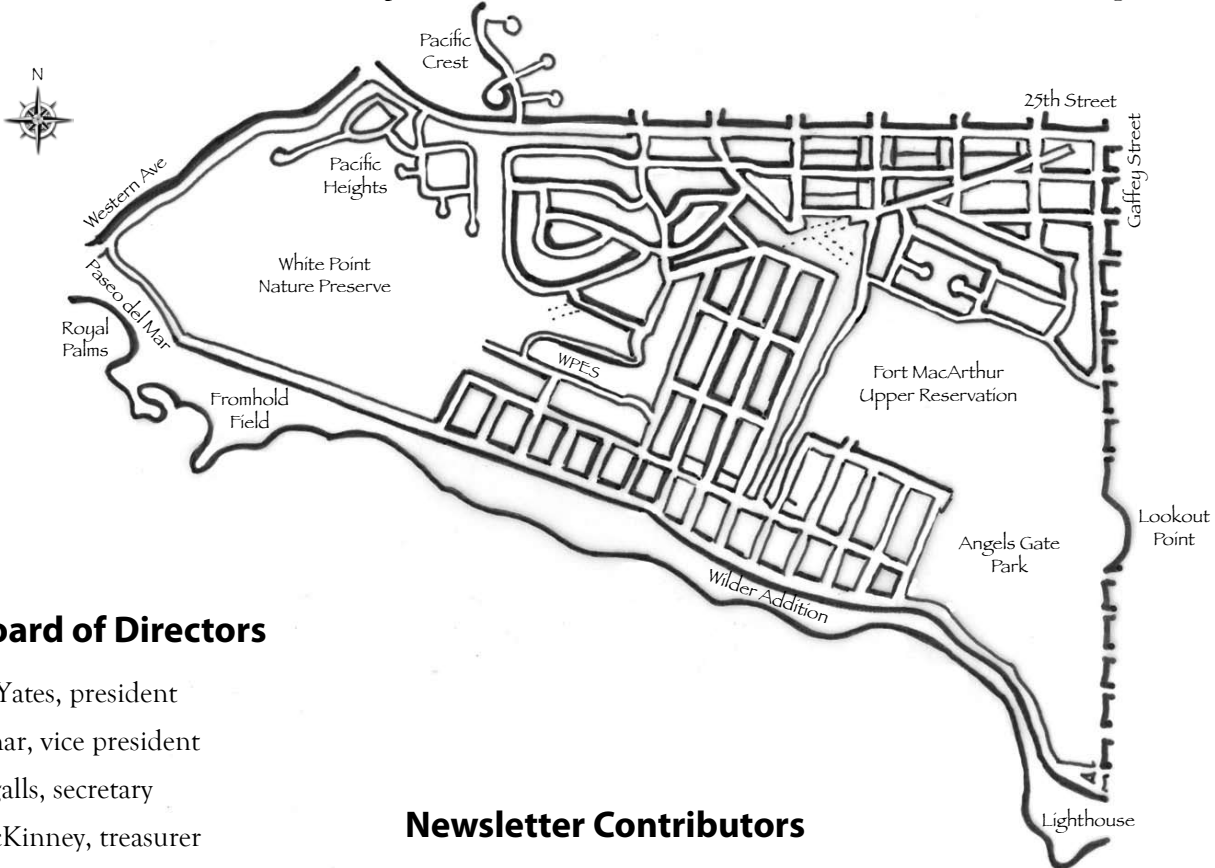
This new tunnel does not service San Pedro's wastewater needs; it is to service other cities' wastewater which is treated in Carson. This program is still in the "public participation" process. It is important to express your opinions regarding this matter to Clearwater and to Councilwoman Janice Hahn. Attendees at the annual PRA meeting in May clearly expressed their preference to Clearwater and Hahn for locating the tunneling in the Port of Los Angeles. 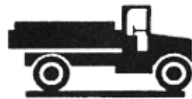

Getting to Know Peggy

Peggy is seven years old. She has bright eyes and shiny black hair. If you walk by her house, she'll come to the front door and talk to you. She's been in this new house at the Harbor Animal Shelter since June 2; before that she lived down the street in a smaller, more crowded and not so pretty shelter for several months.

Peggy's new house has an indoor-outdoor living area and retractable awnings and beautiful landscaping. The floor of her inner room can be heated in the winter, but right now it's summer and Peggy gets really hot on some days. She has heard that the outdoor kennels will be equipped with misters to help with the heat. Peggy would love that but hopes she will be adopted and in her own home before the next heat wave. Peggy loves the play yard and the get-acquainted areas that the new shelter has provided for cats and dogs so they can meet with their new families, but unfortunately she doesn't get to use them very much and spends most of her time alone, looking through the bars, hoping that someone will adopt her and take her home. Peggy doesn't much care about landscaping and pretty awnings. Peggy loves people. Her whole body wiggles at the prospect of someone stopping to talk to her. She loves going for walks, rolling in the grass, getting her belly rubbed. She knows that the day will come when she is adopted because she is a good dog. In the meantime, Peggy's life at the shelter is about waiting, and it gets pretty lonely.

Peggy is one out of over a hundred dogs and an equal number of cats at the Harbor shelter. They all need homes. There are large and small dogs of just about every variety, and


the selection changes all the time. Some of the animals are brought in as strays, abandoned or lost, others are surrendered by their owners, as was Peggy; her owners were moving. Some of the animals are rescued from abusive situations. Too frequently the shelter sees numerous newborn puppies and kittens arrive, some of them without their mothers. The shelter's Baby Bottle Program places them in foster care where they will be nurtured to an age at which they can be adopted.

The shelter also houses reptiles, rabbits, and chickens and is equipped to house birds in the enormous, beautiful aviary. Foghorn, a handsome rooster, was adopted by the shelter as its own pet because he sings his beautiful song a bit too loudly to live in a residential area.

The Harbor Animal Shelter, although not yet a "no-kill" facility, works hard to place the animals in homes. Peggy was on the KTLA morning show on July 4 as the featured dog of the week. She was represented by her Harbor Shelter volunteer pal, Hanna Belyea, who likes to take Peggy out of her kennel for walks and socialization. The shelter, through the New Hope Program, a cooperative outreach effort with rescue groups, foster homes and volunteers, finds homes for many of the animals. Because of shelter overcrowding throughout L.A., a special reduced-rate adoption event was held citywide. The Harbor shelter succeeded in placing forty-four animals during this event. Despite these efforts, overcrowded conditions sometimes put animals' lives in danger.

The shelter has three certified veterinary technicians who take care of the routine medical needs of the shelter animals. When the animals come in very sick or severely injured,

the shelter, through the Star Treatment Program, fully funded by donations, is able to provide hospitalization, surgical care and treatment for adoptable animals. A new spay/neuter clinic will soon be added directly on site.

The Volunteer Program brings in people from all walks of the community to work together to make the animals more comfortable and to enrich their lives, as well as to give an extra pair of hands to the animal care technicians. Volunteers can walk and play with dogs, bathe and groom the animals, photograph them for posting on the shelter website and on the kennel cards; they do laundry (blankets and towels), help keep the kennels clean, feed and provide water, as well as some office work. One of the most rewarding jobs is to accompany the animals to adoption events.

Donations to the shelter are welcome: blankets, towels, beds, treats, newspapers and, of course, money. For a sponsorship donation of \$500, an engraved plaque bearing the name of the donor's family or company will be placed over a kennel or small cage for one year, (renewable) and tax-deductible under IRS Code 170(c)(1). Peggy wishes her name could be placed over a kennel in a laminated plaque instead of on a kennel card.

Post script: After writing this article I went to the LAAS website www.laanimalservices.com to post a link to Peggy's picture, but her picture was gone. Fearing the worst, I went to the shelter to see what had happened. Good news! Peggy was adopted. At age seven, Peggy is a senior. The gentleman who adopted her was over the age of 65, so in accordance with the "Seniors 4 Seniors" program, Peggy's new friend, a very kind and lucky gentleman, got to take Peggy home for free.

Peggy got her wish, a new home before the next heat wave. Fortunately for the other animals, the efforts of Theresa Sardisco, Captain Daniel Pantoja, members of the community and volunteers jump-started the installation of misters beginning July 21.

The Harbor Animal Shelter is located at 957 North Gaffey at Mira Flores Avenue. ☒

Neighborhood Watch Programs in the Palisades

In an effort to make the Palisades area safer for all, two Neighborhood Watch programs have been started in our area. These programs not only teach residents how to protect themselves from area crime, but they also remind us that we all have a responsibility to make the Palisades a safe place to live.

The Angel's Gate/Marine View Neighborhood Watch has boundaries of Hamilton Avenue to the north, 30th Street to the south, Alma Street to the west and Gaffey Street to the east. Meetings are held quarterly and the next meeting will be held Tuesday, September 23, 7:00-8:00 p.m. at the Marine View Apartments office at 2905 S. Cabrillo Avenue.

The Paseo/Palisades Neighborhood Watch has boundaries of 30th Street to the north, Paseo Del Mar to the south, Weymouth Avenue to the west and Gaffey Street to the east. They recently had a meeting on June 18, and another meeting will be scheduled in a few months.

Some of the complaints at the

Neighborhood Watch meetings have been about graffiti, door-to-door solicitors and break-ins, both in cars and homes. The LAPD recommends that if you open your door to a solicitor, ask whether that person has a license to sell. If not, then don't buy.

To protect your car from getting broken into, take a proactive approach. Make sure that you don't leave anything valuable in the car. Be sure your windows are closed tight, lock your vehicle and take your keys with you.

If you witness a crime in progress, call 911 for emergencies and call 1-877-ASK-LAPD for non-emergencies. You may also visit www.lapd.org for more information on crime prevention.
